Purpose:

The Washington Young Lawyers Committee (WYLC) derives its authority from the WSBA Bylaws, WSBA Board of Governors (BOG) Committees and Boards Policy, and WYLC Appointment Policy.

Per Section XII.A of the WSBA Bylaws, the WYLC's purpose is to encourage the interest and participation of:

- 1) new and young lawyers and law students in the activities of the WSBA;
- 2) developing and conducting programs of interest and value to new and young lawyers consistent with the focus areas of public service and pro bono programs, transition to practice, and member outreach and leadership; and upholding and supporting the Guiding Principles of the WSBA.

Strategy to Fulfill Purpose:

This year's focus on fulfilling the WYLC's purpose involves seven key areas:

- 1. Outreach and communication;
- 2. Debt;
- 3. Public Service and Leadership;
- 4. Rural Practice Project;

2019-2020

- 5. Northwest Regional Summit;
- 6. ABA YLD Representation; and
- 7. PREP

The accomplishments and FY20 goals outlined in this document reflect how the work of the WYLC addresses these priorities and fulfills the purpose of the WYLC. These priorities are focused on the four key areas identified in the November 2014 new lawyer survey and July 25, 2015 Generative Discussion of the BOG with the WYLC for key issues facing new and young lawyers: Employment, Debt, Community, and Leadership.

This year, the WYLC replaced subcommittees with project teams to address discrete issues. Project team members may involve constituents who are not members of the WYLC to help accomplish the project team goals.

- 2. Unfortunately, COVID-19 impacted the WYLC's ability to host socials/events/mixers as originally planned. Planned socials in Pierce County and Skamania were cancelled and no further socials are being planned until Washington's phased approached progresses. Meetings have taken place virtually via Zoom.

Debt

- 1. The debt project team presented a Loan Repayment Assistance Program (LRAP) bill to the WYLC. The WYLC voted to forward the bill to the WSBA's legislative affairs team. WYLC Chairelect Brian Neuharth is currently identifying and reaching out to stakeholders for additional impute.
- 2. The debt project team is researching alternative approaches to addressing debt, including income share agreements. The project team generally has met in alternating months to discuss findings.

Public Service and Leadership

- The Public Service and Leadership Award (PSLA) exists to connect and recognize new and young lawyers that demonstrate values of public service and leadership. The WYLC received several applications and voted to honored four new or young lawyers this year with the PSLA. Current WYLC At-large member, and incoming Chair-elect Emily Ann Albrecht will write an article about the PSLA recipients for and upcoming Washington State Bar News issue.
- 2. WYLC Chair Jordan Couch was recognized as the WSBA Outstanding Young Lawyer APEX Award recipient this year.

Rural Practice Project

- 1. WYLC Access to Justice (ATJ) and Rural Recruitment and Retention (RRR) project team, led by WYLC member Alixanne Pinkerton, met with the BOG's rural practice project stakeholders and staff regarding the results of their contacts with rural practitioners in Washington State.
- 2. The WSBA requested the WYLC to assist with research gathering for the rural practice project. WYLC will assist with a specific focus on what will help new and young lawyers in underserved rural areas. WYLC can connect with other groups who are already researching or involved with rural community outreach, to gain information helpful to the issue of legal access in rural communities in Washington State. WYLC could help identify who those entities are that WSBA should be connecting with who have information helpful to the rural practice project.

Northwest Regional Summit

- 1. After researching possibilities and value, the WYLC chose not to co-host the Northwest Regional Summit in partnership with the Oregon New Lawyers Division in 2020.
- 2. Instead of a summit, the WYLC is working on establishing ongoing relationships with new and young lawyers in Oregon, Idaho, Montana, and South Dakota to collaborate on addressing the legal needs of rural areas.

ABA YLD Representation

- 1. The WYLC continued to provide the ABA YLD Meeting Scholarships for new and young lawyers attending ABA meetings as delegates. No delegate spots went unfilled, maximizing Washington's voting power. Scholarship recipients reported to the WYLC regarding their experiences and identified additional ABA opportunities of value to new and young lawyers.
- 2. Current WYLC At-large member and incoming Chair-elect Emily Albrecht served as the ABA YLD District Representative for Washington and Oregon.
- Due to the WYLC's work this past year, the WYLC was acknowledged as an ABA YLD "Star Affiliate" at the ABA Annual Meeting this summer, which recognizes young lawyers who go above and beyond the YLD, the legal profession, and/or the community on a national scale.
 Preadmission Education Program (PREP)

Preadmission Education Program (PREP)

1. The WYLC successfully worked with the WSBA in developing PREP materials.

2020-2021 Goals:

- Debt The WYLC will continue to coordinate with the WSBA's legislative affairs team in the hopes of having the LRAP bill considered in Olympia. Should there be delays in either presenting the bill or the bill actually being passed, the debt project team hopes present recommendations to the WYLC regarding Income Share Agreements. The project team also seeks to identify at least one new mechanism to address debt issues for research. The project team will review the need for a 2021 Financial Focus Series to help educate young lawyers. The need for a new installment will depend on identifying a new topic that has not been previously addressed.
- 2. PSLA The WYLC will award four PSLAs to new or young lawyers and write an article for the *Washington State Bar News* magazine highlighting the impact of the new lawyer's work in the community.
- 3. ATJ/RRR– The WYLC will work on establishing ongoing relationships with new and young lawyers in Oregon, Idaho, Montana, and South Dakota to collaborate on addressing the legal needs of rural areas. The WYLC hopes to become involved in the Western States Bar Conference next year to better connect with rural states and collaborate on solutions. The WYLC will also continue contributing to the WSBA's rural practice project with research.
- 4. Outreach and Communication—It is vital to connect new and young lawyers with WSBA programs, services, and activities. To accomplish this, the WYLC plans to:
 - a. Work on a stronger social media presence by liking, posting, and sharing relevant content and WSBA posts with their new and young lawyer social networks. The WYLC is exploring if new social media platforms are needed to better reach its intended audience as user preferences change over time.
 - b. When Covid-19 phase guidance permits, the WYLC will resuming focusing on developing in-person outreach/communications/events/mixers in partnership with WYLC regional representatives and local bar association young lawyer divisions.
 - c. Determine the best way of distributing a calendar of new lawyer regional events for the year to new admittees.
- 5. ABA YLD representation The WYLC's budget for the next fiscal year provided more funding for ABA YLD scholarships to defray the costs of attending and ensure a full delegation is sent to every meeting. As long as Covid-19 restrictions remain in place, meetings are taking place virtually and scholarships may not be necessary.

- 3) WYLC members brought up the ABA's Embracing Diversity Challenge Award. Sponsored by the ABA YLD, the Challenge recognizes and awards top young lawyer organization programs that increase diversity in the legal profession.

We've focused on social media and closer interaction with the BOG. Unfortunately, WYLC was unable to meet with the BOG at Skamania due to Covid-19.

Welcome/Introductions/Minutes/Plan for the Day

Washington Young Lawyers Committee (WYLC) Chair Brian Neuharth called the meeting to order at 10:01 a.m. He began by commenting on the number of unexcused absences and the lack of quarterly contacts reports being sent out. Brian requested that members communicate absences, reminded that attendance is being tracked and will do 1-1 meetings if prolonged absences continued. Brian gave a brief overview of the meeting's agenda for the day.

WSBA Member Services and Engagement Manager Julianne Unite advised that Kyle McIntee's departure was not captured in the January meeting minutes, and asked if anyone else recalled what time. Brian advised that he left at 1:00 p.m. This will be updated in the minutes from the previous meeting. Brian also requested that Emily Albrecht's absence in the January meeting be changed to be excused. Brian N. asked for additional changes and no requests were made.

On motion by WYLC Member Zachary Bryant, seconded by WYLC Chair elect Emily Ann Albrecht, the WYLC by unanimous vote (11-0-0), approved the January Meeting Minutes, inclusive of the above changes.

WSBA Updates

Julianne provided WSBA updates including the upcoming Board of Governors (BOG) meeting scheduled for March 18-19, 2021. The agenda and meeting materials are posted online. Julianne encouraged WYLC members to review agenda and get involved with any agenda items that they felt necessary.

Julianne introduced Curtiss Melvin as the new WYLC staff liaison. Julianne directed members to please include Curtiss on all future communications to Julianne, as these will go to him in the future.

Julianne provided an updated regarding WSBA's remote work intentions. WSBA staff has been told to expect to work remotely until end of June 2021, subject to changes. WSBA will not be scheduling any in person events through the end of June 2021.

Julianne reported that the WA Supreme Court ruled that WSBA is no longer subject to the Open Public Meetings Act (OPMA). There will be some changes to how we put out notices, however the WSBA Bylaws have a policy that somewhat mirrors the OPMA. Julianne suggested that until this is clearer, the WYLC should continue to operate under the OPMA, as it is stricter then the WSBA Bylaws.

Julianne commented that WYLC Chair Brian will be presenting to the BOG executive committee on the WYLC annual report and suggested that WYLC members provided any feedback to Brian, Julianne and Curtiss via email to be included in Brian's presentation.

BOG Updates

Board of Governor's (BOG) Liaison Russell Knight provided an update on WSBA bar exam, first ever remote bar exam. The exam was administered through ExamSoft with no unresolved issues. The Supreme Court has created bar licensure task force, for future bar exams in Washington state. Governor Knight anticipates the BOG passing a resolution of some kind involving the bar exam, ensuring a minimum level of competence, but wants the task force to look into the form and content of the exam to be sure it is not discriminatory which may lead to a full restructure of the exam.

Governor Knight commented that the WYLC is the critical gate keeper in the next Young Lawyer At large member of the BOG. The WYLC is able to select three or more candidates to be placed on ballot and the BOG is no longer involved in this. The ultimate decision will be made by all new and young lawyers in the state. The deadline to apply is April 20, 2021.

Governor Knight mentioned that the upcoming APEX awards nomination deadline has been extended to March 31, 2021 as there have not been many applicants. Application materials are available on the WSBA website.

BOG At-large Young Lawyer Interview and Selection Process

Brian directed members to page 16 in the meeting materials to review timeline of events for the new process of selection for the open positon. Julianne commented that applications are currently open for the Young Lawyer At large seat and the deadline is April 20, 2021. After all applications are in, materials will be sent to recommendation team. Recommendations will be done by the entire WYLC. Brian asked if anyone had interest in being on the team for candidate selection. Past Chair Jordan Couch commented that he intended to apply, so he would not be interested in the team for candidate selection. WYLC Member Esther Hyun expressed interest in being on this team as well as Emily. Julianne reminded that this team is not making final selections, as that is up to the entire WYLC, but more leading the interview process.

Jordan suggested sending a list serve email to New and Young Lawyer with the candidate forum questions to see what people would like asked of candidates. Brian also suggested having it included on quarterly contacts being sent out in April. Julianne commented that all questions need to be finalized by

April 23[,] 2021, as candidates will be sent invitations with questions to attend the May meeting. Julianne also reminded the WYLC that the selection process could take the entire length of the May WYLC meeting, depending on the number of candidates.

FY21 Budget Team

Brian advised that the budget team met recently and that WYLC needed to adjust due to unspent items as result of COVID. Julianne commented that some budget items were already adjusted due to the WSBA reforecast and advised that the committee needed to decide budget items for FY22. ABA scholarships have not been used to the extent that they have been budgeted in the past, even with in person events. Currently, \$5000 is the budget amount set aside for scholarships, however the ABA meetings are free. Julianne asked if the WYLC wanted to change where and how these scholarship funds are awarded. Brian commented that they could award to local grants; having more flexibility to how these are awarded would be good. Emily also commented that it was discussed that the scholarship money could be awarded for CLE attendance, also. Julianne commented that the line item is "scholarship, awards and grants" and that sections also offer several awards and grants, and that if the WYLC modeled their suggested changes off of something a Section was currently practicing, it may be approved faster by the BOG. Esther commented that the ABA has an "embracing diversity" program, which is an award for local affiliates who put on a diversity project, and would like to put a proposal together for that, which would make WYLC eligible for additional funds from ABA. Brian encouraged Esther to create the proposal. Zac B. commented that he felt pro-bono/low-bono efforts would be a good place to designate funds, and also commented that Oregon does a two day crash course CLE for new lawyers, and suggested some kind of replication of that event.

On motion by Emily, seconded by Zac B., the WYLC unanimously voted (11-0) to approve the budget, with changes to line 58, for FY22.

On motion by Zac B., seconded by Jordan, the unanimously voted (11-0) to modify the 2021 budget to reallocate the ABA Scholarship funds to create a WYLC CLE Scholarship fund.

Brian commented that WYLC Member Aaron Haynes should work with himself and Julianne to finalize the redirection of those funds.

Break for lunch at 11:53 a.m.

Brian called the meeting back to order at 12:30 p.m. and completed roll call for attendance purposes. Esther did not return from lunch. Julianne confirmed we are still at quorum without Esther's attendance.

WYLC and Bar News Update

Brian asked WYLC Members Alyssa Nevala and Marye Scott for Bar News updates. Alyssa commented that they will be reaching out to legal practitioners for answers to the questions. Marye commented that the first QA will be ran in the July/August issue on a two-page spread. They are still working on additional formatting details. Marye commented that the article in the March issue will continue to run until the in July/August issue with the final QA format.

Representative Report Updates

- Aaron commented that he attended the ABA mid-year. He commented on resolutions passed, such as bar reform, supporting gen access to voting & democracy, adopted a national young lawyers' week.
- Alixanne Pinkerton Not in attendance.

- Catherine Holm Not in attendance
- Chelsie Elliot provided an update about Pro Se docket review. This was previously suspended due to COVID but has recently been restarted. This process does not give legal advice, just assistance with document prep.
- Marye –reported that she is getting more involved in the Spokane young lawyer division. There will be some upcoming virtual events, but no additional involvement from the WYLC is needed at this time. She also commented that the other counties aside from Spokane are harder to get in touch with as their Bar Associations tend to be just one person, but will continue to brainstorm on how to connect with these organizations and encourage their involvement.
- Brian reported on her behalf as Riley Moos who was not in attendance. Riley is looking for virtual ways to connect with other attorneys. She has connected with local bar association and minority association. Jordan commented that Pierce Vounty Bar Association is discussing putting on Law Day, however it would require a lot of restructuring to make it happen. Jordan also commented that WYLC could potentially support Law Day in counties that do not have a lot of local bar involvement.
- Zac B. reported that there are a lot of pro bono opportunities exist in Bellingham; ton of upcoming eviction issues. There could be potential to have volunteers from across state due to virtual hearings.
- Zach D. reported that he is in contact with King County Courthouse regarding a help desk program. There is a plan formulated and will have additional detail within the next couple months surrounding volunteer opportunities. Once there is more information, Zach D. will include in report. The King County Bar Association (KCBA) Young Lawyer Division (YLD) is trying to put together speed networking events, mentor/mentee, and potential collaboration with them for WYLC.

Project Team Lead Assignments and Updates

- **Debt:** Brian spoke with Law School Transparency Project to speak more on general issues; they are looking for funding, but WYLC is limited on what they can do. The LRAP bill continues, but it needs something prepared for the next review with legislative affairs committee. Brian needs to update Debt Resources webpage so that all resources are available. Brian commented that some WYLC pages on the WSBA site still need updating.
- ATJ/RRR: Member Alixanne Pinkerton not present.
- **Bylaws:** Zach D. reported that he drafted a cover memo for amendments which needs to be finalized. He would like an additional set of eyes on draft cover memo to provide feedback and then put topic to a vote. The draft memo can be found in the meeting materials packet. Julianne reviewed and provided feedback on draft memo, included the need for additional amendments to by laws should the definition change, and fiscal impact if CLE discounts were extended to lawyers in practice in 10 years. Julianne advised that this could potentially be finalized and reviewed at the May meeting, dependent upon candidate interviews, but could be pushed to July meeting and have approval from BOG by the new fiscal year.
- Awards: Brian reported on behalf of Aaron; he advised that we discussed the budget and expanding the items that "scholarships" includes. This will also include CLE, diversity committee, and more overall discretion on how to use those funds. Brian also advised that dollar amounts budgeted will remain the same.
- **Dress Code:** Jordan reported that he has created cover memo for dress code, including gender neutral norms for courtroom attire. Jordan is looking for feedback on the memo and additional

next changes at the May meeting, Brian commented this would likely be a quick update, and could schedule on the May meeting agenda.

Private shared drive

Brian commented that he attempted to create a shared drive via Google, but ran into issues with sharing access to WYLC members. He commented that if WSBA creates drive, then there could be issues with Open Public Records. Brian asked for feedback on how to create a shared drive. Jordan recommended sharing a Google drive by allowing access to anyone with a direct link. Brian will continue to troubleshoot and resolve issues with the Google drive.

BOG At-Large Bylaws Amendments Discussion

Julianne provided an update on the BOG At-large Bylaws amendments. Julianne also commented on application deadlines and appointment dates. WSBA Volunteer Engagement Advisor Paris Eriksen, suggested to streamline the election process, but having two separate application processes. If someone applies for an at large position but was not selected, they have the opportunity to apply for the other. Brian asked for WYLC feedback on the proposed amendments and dates. Julianne commented that if this schedule was adopted, the WYLC would require an additional special meeting between the March and May meetings to review applications on election years to review application materials and conduct interviews.

On motion by WYLC Member Aaron, seconded by Marye, by unanimous vote (11-0), the WYLC approved to recommend the proposed changes.

FY22 WYLC Applications/Recruitment Update

Julianne commented that applications for majority of open committee positions open Monday, March 15[,] 2021. Julianne updated the WYLC on what positions within the WYLC will be opening and will need applicants for this upcoming cycle. The application deadline will be April 16[,] 2021. Important to note – if members want to remain in their positions they must reapply, if their term is up in September. The Chair Elect must apply through this process as well. Brian commented that the North Central position has been very difficult to fill in the past, and WYLC needs to actively solicit interest in this particular position. Someone from this committee must also apply for the chair-elect position, and advised that this position gets to observe the chair position for a year before actively being Chair. Emily commented that she looked forward to working with the Chair Elect for the year coming, as Chair, to prep them for the position. Julianne advised that applications will be done through the myWSBA portal, and that if you are applying for a specific position member are applying for, to acknowledge that in their cover letter with the application as the application is general, not position specific. Brian asked for additional comments, questions, feedback. No response from members. No additional requests for agenda items.

Welcome/Introductions/Plan for the Day

Washington Young Lawyers Committee (WYLC) Chair Brian Neuharth called the meeting to order at 10:04 a.m. Brian gave a brief overview of the day's agenda, including an interview for Board of Governor (BOG) Russell Knight's replacement as liaison to BOG, a potential vote on dress code and budget topics, and a discussion regarding the possibility of an in-person meeting in July. WYLC members provided introductions and updates since the last WYLC meeting.

BOG Updates

Governor Knight provided updates from recent meetings. He advised that less than half of the governors attended the Spokane meeting in person; most remained remote. Governor Knight recommended doing cost analysis of WYLC attending an in-person meeting in Portland for the upcoming July meeting, and interactions with Portland Bar Association (will it actually be worth attending in person). It was also recommended to consider pushing in person events out farther. Governor Knight also provided feedback on technical difficulties during the Spokane Board of Governors meeting.

Governor Knight thought it was very interesting that there was the only applicant for the BOG seat for Young Lawyer, and questioned if the election process changed the interest of applicants. Jordan wants to continue building this community for others and creating opportunities for those around him.

Chair elect Emily asked what peaked your interest in this positon? Jordan responded that h is interested in this position because he feels there is a lot of opportunity available. Young Lawyers have been doing a lot of good work that has been passed up to the BOG, and Jordan see this position as an opportunity to guide those projects and help continue them by having a role with the BOG. Jordan wants to be a voice for Young Lawyers and feels he has a firm understanding of how things work, who is on the BOG now and how to communicate with them.

Brian asked what is your familiarity with WSBA and WYLC? Jordan was a Young Lawyer Liaison for the Solo and Small Practice Section, which started his attendance of WYLC meetings, and has also served on several committees within WSBA.

Brian asked how would you use this positon to advance the mission of the WYLC and WSBA? Jordan wants to bring more of a voice to the public and bring more public involvement, and getting members involved and engaged in making people wanting to be a part of the WSBA. What do we need to do to engage members more and make them feel their dues are worth it? Jordan feels that the WYLC needs to be a voice for young lawyers and their constituents.

Brian asked for an example of a time you were given feedback and incorporated that in your work. Jordan described a time where he did not like a particular process, and received feedback from Governor Knight on the situation. He took the information back to the WYLC, and as a result New and Young Lawyers have an opportunity to be involved in voting processes.

Brian asked what is your communication style when part of group brainstorming ideas? Jordan described himself as very aggressive, and open to sharing ideas and opinions, but needs to work on being more reserved. Likes to encourage people to talk and share before sharing ideas of his own. Open to change in his ideas and opinions.

Brian asked have you served on other boards? Jordan responded, yes. WYLC, Solo & Small Practice section, ATJ tech committee, COVID task force, and WA bar licensure task force, Solo and Small Firm Conference Committee, has also served in the local level with the Tacoma Bar Association and some roles with the ABA level as well. Jordan is really excited about the fact that a lot of projects on the WYLC are being pushed to the BOG and that the WYLC restructured around projects as a whole.

Brian asked what do you understand the time commitment to be? Jordan responded that he understood the commitment to be a monthly meeting, lasting two days, as well as a bi-monthly meeting

for the WYLC for at least one hour. He also anticipates spending up to 10 hours per week for bar related activities. Jordan also commented that he is preparing for that time commitment by winding down other commitments with the WYLC, Tacoma Bar Association, American Bar Associations and the ATJ Tech Committee.

Emily asked do you have ambitions of becoming a BOG member? Jordan responded that at some point, he would like to become a BOG member. However, he would like more experience prior to seeking that role.

Brian asked could you describe a time you disagreed with a colleague and what the decision was when that happened? Jordan had disagreed with a colleague during the LRAP project; he felt both were good ideas. This led to conversations about how to push both ideas versus pushing one over the other. Brian followed up with asking about a more severe disagreement, asking what Jordan's response would be. Jordan felt that the ability to separate his personal feelings from group decisions will be important in this potential role. He would be open to bringing on someone who would represent the idea in a better capacity then he could, if he was really opposed.

Brian asked what do you see the biggest challenges for young lawyers over the next 3 years? Jordan responded with student debt, struggles to find career path and pay off other debt.

Brian asked how would you support diversity equality and understanding through the legal community? Jordan responded that we need to make sure we are creating spaces and advocating for those not in the room. Educating self, creating spaces and make sure those that are not present have a voice.

Brian asked what should the bar association do about high amount of debt? Jordan responded that he felt there are structural inefficiencies in the system; not all legal work needs to look the same. "Not all lawyers need to sell a Lamborghini". Jordan feels attorneys should offer services that people want, versus limited themselves to certain areas. This type of cultural shift could apply to law schools as well.

Brian asked do you think the Bar is doing enough to increase access to justice for those with moderate incomes? Jordan replied, no. I think they are trying, but not enough. People do not want a lawyer, they want a solution to their problem. Creating access to justice is not just about bringing lawyers to people with moderate income. Brian asked if Emily had any additional questions, as chair elect, no additional questions. Brian opened up questions to additional members of the WYLC.

WYLC Member Zachary Bryant asked Jordan if he felt there needed to be a push for more work life **balance.** Jordan responded that yes, he felt that better business practices were needed in law firms so that people didn't feel the "need to grind so hard".

WYLC Member Esther Hyun asked if you could tell us at the end of your term, what would be a couple things you'd have accomplished by the end? Jordan commented that one thing he would like to see is more than 3 candidates to replace him. A big part of his responsibility is modeling behavior, young lawyers should see his work and think "I want to do that too". He also wants to see the things that WYLC is pushing to the BOG get through and be finalized and put into place, and to continue to strengthen the relationship with BOG and WYLC.

BOG At-large Young Lawyer Discussion

Jordan was removed from the group to provide a space for discussion. Brian asked for feedback from the WYLC members. Emily commented that she trusts that Jordan would put the required time in, and has no doubt he would be a fantastic candidate. Zachary B. commented he couldn't imagine a more qualified candidate, and he agrees with Emily's comments about competency. Brian commented that he has ambition and drive. Emily feels he would not shy away from speaking on WYLC's behalf. Brian asked for additional comments/questions – no responses.

On motion by WYLC Member Zac B. and seconded by Emily, and abstentions by Jordan Couch, the WYLC by majority vote (8-0-1) approved to recommend Jordan Couch for the WYLC At-large Young Lawyer Governor position.

Dress Code Rules

Jordan advised that there's a letter going to committee on professional ethics, then to the BOG regarding dress code rules and revisions. Brian asked if anyone had comments or questions regarding the substance of the letter.

On motion by Jordan, seconded by Esther, the WYLC by unanimous vote (9-0) approved to send the Dress Code letter to the Committee on Professional Ethics.

WSBA Updates

WSBA Member Engagement Specialist Curtiss Melvin provided updates on Wellbeing Week in Law that took place May 3-7. He also provided an update on the Trial Advocacy Project (TAP) that is taking place May 21-22. WSBA Member Services and Engagement Manager Julianne Unite commented that the mock trial portion of TAP is not taking place this year due to COVID and the constraints of a virtual environment; it will just be the 2-day seminar. Curtiss commented that Young Lawyer Liaison applications are due June 24, and appointments will be finalized in early August. The tentative dates for orientation are slated for September 27, October 1 or October 4.

Julianne also commented on the CLE spring sale that is currently happening now through May 11 for On Demand content within the WSBA CLE Store.

Julianne provided an update about WSBA exploring options for hybrid meeting types. The WYLC or other bar entities must follow an approval process set forth by WSBA for any potential in person meetings. Please reach out to Julianne for additional context and guidance.

WYLC Membership Updates

Julianne provided an update that Member Maha Jaffarey has resigned from the WYLC, effective April 21, 2021. WSBA staff reached out for feedback on her resignation, and Julianne recommended that WYLC members process the feedback, rather than discussion forum at this point, and suggested discussion take place at a future meeting. Curtiss advised WYLC members that Maha felt that the time commitment for her at large position was too challenging with her family environment. She also felt that there was not enough diversity and inclusion with in the WYLC, as she was the only minority person on the committee. Maha felt that because of that lack of inclusivity, she did not feel comfortable sharing concerns and opinions when she felt she should have interjected. In additional, she felt the WYLC felt very transactional in the means that they came together, shared content and left; she did not feel included. Emily commented that she felt the feedback provided from Maha is very helpful. Brian commented that resignations happen, that the feedback is not something the WYLC needs to take too

personally. He appreciates the feedback, and requested that WYLC members reach out directly to share any additional feedback with him directly.

FY22 WYLC Applications, Recruitment and Recommendations

Julianne commented on applications received for open WYLC positions and that there are no qualified candidates for certain regions. Brian asked about a WSBA Bylaw or otherwise amendment to allow for taking a candidate from another region and allowing them to take the position in a region that they do not reside. Julianne advised that it wouldn't be a Bylaws amendment, but it would still need to go to before the BOG. Julianne commented that recommendations team will meet week of May 17, and advised members to watch their email for additional information on this meeting.

WYLC and Bar News

Member Alyssa Nevala updated on the Bar News column. Received two great questions via Google form. Advised that she reached out to Jordan for assistance with answering questions, and is finding some difficulty in knowing who to reach out to for what questions. Advised that first column is set to run in July/August. Member Mayre Scott commented that if members come across questions during their interactions, to direct those people to submit those questions for the Bar News article. Reminded that all questions are anonymous.

Break for lunch at 11:55 a.m.

Brian called the meeting back to order at 12:15 p.m.

Representative Reports

- Member Zachary Davison advised that he attended a speed-mentorship event provided by the King County Bar Association (KCBA) Young Lawyer Division. There was quite a bit of interest from both mentors and mentees. Engaging process, thought it would be a good idea to expand on in the future and maybe partner with. Alyssa commented that vice chair of KCBA reached out asking if the WYLC would be interested in collaborating for some kind of mentoring program. Julianne commented that mentorship falls under Member Services and Engagement at WSBA. Advised that Washington provides CLE credit for mentor/mentee relationships. That WSBA supports mentorship programs, and could do more within allowed resources. Julianne requested that any entities asking for partnerships to be directed to Julianne, Curtiss and/or Chelle for additional information. Zach D. & Alyssa both commented on the timing between the KCBA New Lawyer Division and the WYLC's meeting schedules, making it difficult to come to a decision on some topics.
- Zac B. provided no updates at this time.
- Member Chelsie Elliott did not return from lunch.
- Member Esther Hyun did not return from lunch.
- Marye commented that Spokane Young Lawyer Division (YLD) had a successful zoom mentorship event, with a zoom panel to ask young lawyers about their first couple years of practice. There is an opportunity to recruit Gonzaga students to join the YLD. She is hoping to have more in person events as things start to open up more. Emily commented that she really liked this approach and feels the WYLC should encourage those younger in practice to mentor earlier then later.

Project Team Updates

- **Bylaws:** Zach D. provided an update on the WYLC name change and that he needs to submit letter to the BOG. Esther has objections to having tenure start when bar membership starts in Washington. Feels that tenure should be 10 years after any jurisdiction. She does not feel that we should allow members to be included in the new and young lawyers if they've been practicing for 20-30 years elsewhere. Emily asked about the likelihood of having someone with that much tenure trying to join as a new/young member. Zachary responded that he feels it would be somewhat unlikely, and would rather run the risk of being over-inclusive. On motion by Zach D., seconded by Jordan, the WYLC voted (8-1-0) to approve the amendment and transmission of letter to the BOG regarding the WYLC name change.
- **Debt:** Brian provided an update on the Debt Project Team He spoke with Governor Higginson about the LRAP, and offered to allow the use of his materials. Brian thinks that it would be helpful to have a larger group outside of the WYLC to address these issues.
- ATJ/RRR: Julianne commented on the STAR Committee, which will be a larger committee dedicated to support rural practice in Washington state. The formation of the Committee was approved unanimously by the BOG. A project team will be meeting Monday, May 10, 2021 to discuss the next steps for this committee. Julianne advised that materials for the committee can be found in the April BOG meeting materials packet.
- Awards: Brian advised that reps from awards are not present but information can be found in meeting materials. Julianne commented that updated Public Service Leadership Award application is now posted online and applications are being accepted. This award requires someone else to nominate the recipient. Applications will be reviewed during the July 17th WYLC meeting. Julianne also commented on the WYLC's decision to move ABA funds to CLE Scholarship. Approved CLE scholarship information, process and application can be found in this meetings material packet for review. We are currently working on a webpage to house this information, and will follow up when this information is live for applicants.

FY21 Budget Team

Julianne advised that budget and overview process can be found in the materials packet on page 31. It should be assumed that budgetary impacts will continue due to COVID-19. There will be impact on reductions in some line items, particularly in person events and meetings. Julianne advised that it is unlikely that the budget will be approved for increases and it is more likely that it will need to be further reduced.

July WYLC meeting

Brian commented that he wanted to be present in person for the July meeting. He advised that members could still have the choice to attend virtually. Zach D. suggested using one camera for all in person members, and could volunteer his office location in Portland. Jordan fully supports in person meeting if people feel comfortable. Julianne commented on requirements of hybrid meetings. No staff shall be required to attend. The logistics of setting up meeting rooms etc., would fall to volunteers. Would also require a COVID-19 guidelines of Oregon, since meeting is in Portland. Brian asked for clarification on the volunteer's involvement if no WSBA staff is attending. Julianne commented that the volunteer would be connecting with the location for logistics, food ordering, etc. Will also require approval from the WSBA Executive Director or Department Director.

Budget Overview & Process

The Budget and Audit Committee of the WSBA Board of Governors is responsible for developing the annual WSBA budget. The WSBA budget is a policy document and management tool that allocates funds to fulfill our regulatory responsibilities to protect the public, and to help members succeed in the practice of law.

About the Budget

- The WSBA's fiscal year is Oct. 1–Sept. 30.
- The Budget and Audit Committee of the Board of Governors oversees the budgeting and financial matters of the WSBA.
- The WSBA's Chief Financial Officer is responsible for the WSBA's financial operations.
- WSBA oversees an annual operating budget over \$20 million dollars.
- The budgeting processes begin as early as January by WSBA staff in preparation for the following fiscal year.
- The WSBA budget uses department codes, cost centers, and line items to identify and organize WSBA programming.

About the WYLC Budget

• WYLC expenses are captured as line items in the Member Services and Engagement cost center. Below are the four line items that correspond to the work of the WYLC.

• Line item 50095 is for the CLE comps for the Public Service Leadership Award recipients. In the past few years, recipients have not been redeeming their free CLE benefit. The WYLC may want to consider whether to continue to offer this as a benefit or change what is offered. In FY21, the WYLC expanded to the CLE benefit to include Deskbooks.

- Line item 55266 allocates funding for outreach events. In FY20, fiscal year the WYLC planned to
 host two outreach events in conjunction with the two meetings outside Seattle and one end of
 year outreach event in September. However, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, outreach events
 did not occur. For FY21, the pandemic continues to impact in-person events and the WYLC may
 reconsider using these funds in a different way.
- Line item 58525 was historically for the ABA Scholarship Awards. In the past, the WYLC awarded up to five \$500 scholarships for both the ABA Midyear and Annual Meetings. Starting in FY21, the WYLC increased the total amount of scholarships to \$5,000 to encourage more people to volunteer as ABA YLD delegates and/or increase the award amounts for recipients. However, in FY21, the ABA meetings were free and virtual so the WYLC voted on 3/13/2021 to use these funds for CLE scholarships for new and young lawyers. In FY22, the WYLC will determine other possible ways to disburse scholarship funds, which may include scholarships to attend ABA meetings, CLE scholarships, and other donations/grants.
- Line item 55270 allocates meeting costs, which currently includes three out of Seattle meetings. Generally, the WYLC hosts two - three outside of Seattle meetings in a year. Overall, this cost went down significantly in FY20 due to the COVID-19 pandemic and transition to virtual only meetings. Starting in FY20, this also included an allocation of up to \$3,000 for the ABA District Rep/WYLC At-large member to attend the ABA YLD meetings. In FY21, due to the pandemic, the WYLC has been meeting virtually with no costs incurred to date. The reforecast FY21 number assumes the WYLC may be able to meet in person in Portland, OR with the Board of Governors in July 2021.

Timeline

WSBA staff will prepare the Member Services and Engagement Cost Center in late March. Staff's role/goal is to ensure the committee has adequate funds to carry out its work in furtherance of the WSBA mission. The committee must provide clear goals and explanation of what it needs to accomplish these goals.

Any budget change requests to the existing WYLC line items (increase, decrease or shift in how funds will be used) must be made to Julianne Unite. This request must include the following information:

1.	What is the change/request?	
2.	 What is the amount? Does this include an overall increase, or are you moving funds from anther line item?

During the selection process, the WYLC will consider the nominee's leadership in their community and involvement in public service activities as described in <u>RPC 6.1</u>. Long-term service or an extraordinary contribution to the community will be considered, including:

- a) leadership and service in the local community or within a bar association;
- b) WSBA, ABA, or local bar association activities;
- c) Volunteering with pro bono or public service programs; or
- d) Writing a blog post for <u>NWSidebar</u> and/or writing an article for <u>WSBA magazine</u>.

The WYLC will select the award recipients at the July 15, 2021 WYLC meeting. All application materials will be included in the WYLC meeting materials packet and posted online. Confidential information will be redacted from publication. Recipients may only receive the award once during the WSBA fiscal year (October 1 –September 30).
